












If you do leave your seat during a break in play please remain at the bottom of the stairs for a stoppage in play before returning. The stewards will be there to advise you of this.

Another view of the Origins of Ice Hockey

Many people believe that hockey is a Native American sport due to its long history of being played by Indigenous peoples. However, while it is true that various forms of stick and ball games have been played in North America for centuries. the modern game of ice hockey as we know it today has European roots.

The earliest known version of the game was played in England during the 18th century and involved skating on frozen ponds or lakes with a round ball instead of a puck. It wasn't until the mid-19th century that rules were standardized and teams began playing organized matches.

In North America, early versions of ice hockey were played primarily by British soldiers stationed in Canada before spreading throughout Canadian cities and eventually making their way into the United States. While First Nations players did participate in early games at times, they were not always welcome due to racism and discrimination faced by Indigenous peoples.

Therefore, while there are connections between certain aspects of traditional Native American stick games and modern-day ice hockey, it would be inaccurate to say that hockey is solely a Native American creation. Nonetheless, like many sports around the world, it has become an important part of popular culture among numerous groups - including those within various Indigenous communities across North America.

The myth that hockey is a Native American sport has been around for quite some time. However. this is far from true. Hockey originated in Europe during the 18th century, specifically in England and France. The first recorded use of skates

> on ice dates back to Scotland in 1740. From there, the sport evolved

into what we know today as hockey with games being played both indoors and outdoors across various European countries.

The integration of ice hockey among Native Americans began later when they were introduced to the sport by Canadian settlers who took up residence near their reservations or boarding schools which taught children about Canada culture including its obsession with hockey.

In conclusion, the idea that hockey belongs solely to native people is nothing but a cultural misappropriation. While Native Americans deserve recognition for introducing their unique sports like lacrosse and snow-snake games - two sports deeply rooted within indigenous communitiesgiving credit to Europeans will no way reduce pride towards those cultures roots instated together through generations of acquiring knowledge developed over time through group interaction. The game was initially called "shinty" or "shinny," which comes from the Scottish Gaelic word "sionnach." The stick used to play shinty resembled today's hockey sticks but had no blade at its end.

In many Indigenous cultures, people would use frozen animal bladders as pucks, which they would hit with long wooden poles. European settlers adopted this version of shinny, adding elements such as goals and organized teams.

Over time, ice rinks were built specifically for the purpose of playing this new version of shinny. In 1875, students at Montreal's McGill University came up with standardized rules for what we now call ice hockey.

You will also be able to watch the team warm up from the Capitals bench (helmet and face guard must be worn and can be provided).

As the lights go down and the atmosphere rises, you will skate out with the player of your choice for the opening Face-Off, and photos will be taken as you come through the Caps tunnel. You will then head into the huddle for fist bumps as the boys get ready for game time. Your name will also be announced to the crowd, and your photos and experience will be posted on our club's social media pages.

All mascots and guests must wear a helmet (with a face guard, if under 21). Helmets can be provided. If you

are doing a walk-on package, no kit is required.

This will again be on a first-come, first-served basis, and packages are now available to purchase through the Capitals Fanbase App for each home game.

Hockey Analytics 101: What the data say about strategies that work

A lot of the time, all we see during a hockey game are the goals, the time, the teams, and who scored. There is, however, a lot of data behind this that tells stories about how teams win, not just what they do. Analytics in hockey aren't a trend; they're a step forward. Teams are eager to know where they are failing and where they are succeeding, as well as what actions are leading to goals. A lot of the time, all we see during a hockey game are the goals, the time, the teams, and who scored. There is, however, a lot of data behind this that tells stories about how teams win, not just what they do. Analytics in hockey aren't a trend; they're a step forward. Teams are eager to know where they are failing and where they are succeeding, as well as what actions are leading to goals.

Goals and helpers used to make people happy. How many shots were taken from hazardous places, how many chances did we provide our opponents, how often did we hold the puck, and how often did we exit the defence zone? Everything must be measured.

It helps to know what experts are looking at to figure out which tactics will work. These are the important places:

- Puck control and an edge in the territory. Controlling the game means more than just having the puck. It means being in the offensive zone more than the defense zone. Two measures show how many shots are made on goal for and against a team. It shows that a team is better when it takes more shots on the other team's goal than it lets them.
- 2. Quality of shots and chances to score. Every shot is different. A team is not very good if it shoots a lot but from bad spots or is easily stopped. The xG metric predicts how many goals a group of shots will score.
- 3. Going from defense to offense and back through neutral. Transitions are how quickly and cleanly a team leaves its zone, how well it enters the other team's zone, and how well it runs the game in the middle zone. This kind of information lets you find "bottlenecks" in the way the team is set up.
- 4. How well special groupings (power play, penalty kill) work. The jobs change depending on how many people are on each team. By looking at analytics, you can see where your team loses the most and where it can win.
- Athletes' training and work load. Sensors in current systems measure speed, acceleration, distance, and fatigue. This helps you plan work, keep well, and prepare for key season events.

We now know what measures are used, so let's look at how teams use them to get more wins.

First, the study shows that "we controlled" as well as "we fought". A positive Corsi/Fenwick ratio means that a team makes more strikes than it stops. Win-more teams have this ratio. The goal is to play more attack and less

defense.

The quality of your shots matters more than the quantity. Suppose a team shoots a lot but seldom scores. Then wins might still be hard to come by. Teams that win try to make great plays, like shots from close range, low angles, and well-timed passes. According to xG analytics, we will have more chances if we improve how we enter zones and move players around. This means that the plan is a good one.

Third, change and organization. If a team loses the puck often when leaving the zone and allows the opposing team to attack, it might lose even with the puck. It reveals "our exits are less clean" & "we lose the puck more often in the neutral zone". The plan changes: improved exits, stronger neutral zone transitions, and player directions. A team's "digital twin", for instance, may be used to test alternative patterns and watch how shots against and missed chances vary.

Fourth, unique events. A lot of the time, the power play and penalty kill help teams win titles. Analytics show them where they don't protect well when they're short-staffed and what kind of attack from their opponents gives them the most trouble. This information helps them set up a formation that works better.

Fifth, player load and how fresh they are. Teams that have players who are close to their best level instead of those who are hurt or burned out win. Sensors and data tracking help leaders plan breaks, changes, and ways to keep key players from getting too tired so that they can do their best.

- Picture yourself as a coach for a team. You have information: the team shoots a lot, but the average xG is low because many of the shots come from bad spots.Reduce errors by including middle zone help in tactical strategies to go into the scoring zone.
- Change where the shots are coming from; instead of just hitting from far away, attack closer to the goal from "dangerous" spots.
- Check who plays on the power play. The data shows that when you're down a player, your opponent attacks more often from the left side, so when you're down a player, change your team or strategy. Work with your players to reduce their workload. The numbers show that long runs without changes make the team slower and increase the number of turnovers. Cut down on replacements and make the most of rest time. Monitor possession metrics. Monitor Corsi and Fenwick throughout each shift and transfer players if specific trios or pairings lose area or control



I to M of Hockey Terms

<u>lcing</u>

The situation which occurs when a player shoots or dumps the puck across both the center red line and the opposing team's goal line without the puck going into the net or being touched by an opposing player in their neutral or defensive zones. If an opposing player is first to touch a puck which has crossed both lines in this way, a linesman immediately stops play. Play is resumed with a faceoff in the defending zone of the team that committed the infraction. In many amateur leagues, the "no-touch" icing rule is used, whereby play stops as soon as the puck crosses the goal line. The NHL adopted a rule where the team that committed the infraction is unable to make a line change during the stoppage, so as to discourage teams from icing the puck in order to "get a whistle" which would allow them to change lines; this change has subsequently been adopted by many pro and high-level amateur leagues, but not all. Additionally, most professional and amateur leagues have also adopted a rule whereby play is not stopped if the team committing the icing is shorthanded due to a penalty as in the SNL.

Insurance goal

A goal giving a team a two-point lead over the opposing team.

Interference

The act of impeding an opponent who does not control the puck, an illegal action which incurs a penalty.

Kicking

- 1. The act of propelling the puck using the skates. A goal may not be scored by kicking a puck into the opposing team's net.
- 2. The act of kicking an opposing player. This attracts a match penalty.

Kneeing

The act of making contact with an opposing player when leading with an outstretched knee, an illegal action which incurs a penalty

Left wing lock

A defensive ice hockey strategy similar to the neutral zone trap. In the most basic form, once puck possession changes, the left wing moves back in line with

the defensemen. These three defenders then play a zone defence by covering a third of the ice each. Since there are normally only two

defencemen, this tactic helps to avoid odd man rushes.

Line change

During play, or after a whistle, a team may choose to substitute their forwards and/or their defencemen, usually in order to keep their players fresh or to match certain players against certain opposing players.

Long change

In the second period, the goaltenders change ends, meaning that the players' bench is closer to the offensive zone rather than the defensive zone. The "long change" can be a factor when a tired line is stuck in the defensive zone and cannot come off due to the increased distance to the bench.

Man advantage

The situation that results when one team is penalized and one of its players is sent to the penalty box, causing the opposing team to have one more player on the ice than the penalized team for the duration of the penalty (major penalty) or until a goal is scored (minor penalty). If two penalties are called on the same team there will be a two-man advantage. If more than two penalties are called on one team the man advantage is limited to two men.

Major penalty

A five-minute penalty

<u>Michigan</u> Also called a **high wrap** or the **lacrosse move**.

The manoeuver of lifting the puck with the stick and throwing it under the top corner of the goal while skating behind the net, while the goaltender protects the bottom corner

Match penalty

A five-minute penalty that includes automatic expulsion from the game and, depending on the league, possibly subsequent games as well. Match penalties are usually called on only the most serious infractions, such as attempts to deliberately injure an opponent, official, or fan.

Misconduct

A penalty in which the offending player is ruled off the ice for 10 minutes, but may be substituted with another player on the ice.

N H L'ers Looking Forward to Olympic Games

A few weeks into the season and the NHL is starting to find its rhythm. Players are back to the grind that is the regular season: travel, four games in seven nights and a healthy dose of on-ice and video sessions. Coaches inundated with detail and a constant desire to improve. It is, looking and feeling like business as usual.

That business mostly consists of thirty-two teams vving for the Stanley Cup. But what can also be true, is that for the first time in a dozen years, it's not the only symbol of hockey supremacy up for grabs.

For the first time since 2014, NHL players will have the chance to compete and represent their home country at the 2026 Winter Olympic Games in Milan. That news provided its own initial excitement when it was first publicly addressed in Toronto at the 2024 All -Star Weekend but the excitement was intensified this summer when each country announced the first six players of their respective teams. Needless to say, there was a certain buzz around locker rooms in the opening weeks of the season.

Olympic Chatter Commonplace in Locker room

"It's always a topic," said Oilers' German forward, Leon Draisaitl. "I think guys that are in the running for it or have the chance are excited about it. Obviously, it's been a lot of years since the NHL players have gone, so for a lot of players it will be the first time and that obviously creates a lot of excitement."

Mattias Ekholm, a teammate of Draisaitl with the Oilers, might not have been one of the first six announced for his home country of Sweden, but has a chance to try and carve out a spot and be part of the excitement and chance to highlight the game.

"Everybody saw the games and what type of hockey we can showcase to the world," said Ekholm. "I think the Olympics is going to be

something special for whoever goes there. It seems like the 4Nations was just a warmup. I think the Olympics will be even another level to it. It's for sure something that's exciting."

Of the seventy-two players announced to their respective nations in June, only four current NHL talents competed in the 2022 Winter games in Beijing-Rodrigo Abols and Uvis Balinskis of Latvia and Simon Nemec and Juraj Slafkovsky of Slovakia. Among the veteran NHLer's returning to the Olympic stage for the first time since Sochi is Sidney Crosby. The Canadian Penguins' forward earned a pair of gold medals at the games and had the game-winning tally in Vancouver in 2010.

"I think all that stuff helps," said Crosby on the boost Olympic excitement can bring to players early on. "I think winning is probably the best, but as far as the energy and I think, just healthy competition when it comes to spots in the lineup, I think that's something that can give us a spark."

Any spark, buzz or lift in energy is welcomed, especially by a head coach, but the focus remains balanced between NHL club and national team early on—even for one Olympic-bound.

"There are discussions about the opportunities and what the tournament is going to be like and potential possible players," said John Hynes, head coach of the Minnesota Wild and assistant for Team USA. "I would say for the most part, at least in our building and our room, it's more focused on what we're doing. I would assume as the season goes on, there might be more chatter about

That chatter only figures to get louder from locker room to locker room and beyond as the calendar turns on October next week. Yet another step closer to a long-awaited and evidently, much-anticipated opportuni-
